- ·Building and dedication of Temple
- · Accumulation of wealth and influence
- ·His spiritual decline, a few steps to deep spiral of disobedience and sin

Meaning of "meaningless"?

• הבל

- (phonetic) hevel
- Literal: Mist, vapour
- Synonomous parallelism
 - · Chasing after the wind
- Metaphor for "of fleeting value"?
- Must be interpreted in each context

Various translations

- NIV Meaningless

- AV, NKVJ Vanity

- NASB Futility

- Message Smoke



Interpretation of metaphor?


- In each context throughout book
- Start with actual meaning at the time
- Interpret its use as metaphor in context
- Example:
- Ch 9:7 Go, eat your food with gladness, and drink your wine with a
 joyful heart, for it is now that God favours what you do.
- 8 Always be clothed in white, and always anoint your head with oil.
- 9 Enjoy life with your wife, whom you love, all the days of this
 meaningless FLEETING life that God has given you under the sun
 all your meaningless FLEETING days. For this is your lot in life and
 in your toilsome labour under the sun.



Under the sun?

- · 1. the world where people live
- 2. perspective where people ignore God in how they choose to live in the world
- 3. Solomon's own perspective where He ignored God in his choices

What does "under the sun" mean?



Wisdom?

- The ability to use your knowledge and experience to make good decisions and judgments (Cambridge)
- The soundness of an action or decision with regard to the application of experience, knowledge, and good judgment (Oxford)
- Where do we find the greatest good for people?

Usage in Ecclesiastes

- The opposite of madness and folly (1:17)
- The best application of knowledge (1:16)
- The source of the best wisdom is God (2:26)
- The capability to discern
 - The strategy and tactics that deliver the best results (2:3)
 - » The appropriate time (3)
 - » The best goals to strive for (6)
 - The nature of the people and the situations around you(7)
 - The motivations that deliver the greater good (6:4)
 - The values of relationships (6:8)
 - The resolve for self control (7)
- The capabilities to learn from new knowledge & experience with resolve to improve

 - · Fear of God, Jesus & His Example, God's Word, Holy Spirit
- Partners (Receiving, Applying & Imparting)
 - · Knowledge, Instruction, Understanding, Experience
- Types and Presentation
 - · God's versus the world's folly
 - · Choices and outcomes are best based on God's Character and Will
- · Capabilities & Practiced Skills
 - Discretion
 - · Judgment
 - · Counsel
 - Reproof
 - Relational
 - · Self Control
 - Humility

Purposes in writing?

- 1. To show that all earthly goals viewed as ends in themselves result in a sense of valueless pursuit
- 2. To demonstrate that ignoring God and living in disobedience is a slide to depths of sin, which leads to God's judgment
- 3. To discern wisdom
- 4. To exhort the younger generation to live with and for God as the key to the greatest good.


- · The problem stated

Ecclesiastes 1:1-12

The starting point for the Preacher Ecclesiastes 1:13-18

- · 12 I, the Teacher, was king over Israel in Jerusalem.
- 13 I devoted myself to study and to explore by wisdom all that is done under heaven. What a heavy burden God has laid on men!
- 14 I have seen all the things that are done under the sun; all of them are meaningless, a chasing after the wind.
- 15 What is twisted cannot be straightened; what is lacking cannot be counted.
- 16 I thought to myself, "Look, I have grown and increased in wisdom more than anyone who has ruled over Jerusalem before me; I have experienced much of wisdom and knowledge."
- 17 Then I applied myself to the understanding of wisdom, and also of madness and folly, but I learned that this, too, is a chasing after the wind.
- 18 For with much wisdom comes much sorrow; the more knowledge, the more grief.

The Experience of Solomon

Ecclesiastes 2:1-11

- I thought in my heart, "Come now, I will test you with PLEASURE
 to find out what is good." But that also proved to be fleeting.
- · 2 "LAUGHTER," I said, "is foolish. And what does pleasure accomplish?"
- 3 I tried cheering myself with WINE, and embracing FOLLY —
 my mind still guiding me with wisdom. I wanted to see what was
 worth while for men to do under heaven during the few days of
 their lives.
- 4 I undertook great projects: I built HOUSES for myself and planted VINEYARDS.
- 5 I made GARDENS and PARKS and planted all kinds of fruit trees in them.
- 6 I made RESERVOIRS to water groves of flourishing trees.

The Experience of Solomon

Ecclesiastes 2:1-11

- 7 I bought male and female SLAVES and had other slaves who were born in my house. I also owned more herds and flocks than anyone in Jerusalem before me.
- 8 I amassed SILVER AND GOLD for myself, and the treasure
 of kings and provinces. I acquired men and women SINGERS, and
 a HAREM as well the delights of the heart of man.
- 9 I became greater by far than anyone in Jerusalem before me.

 In all this my wisdom stayed with me.
- 10 I denied myself nothing my eyes desired; I refused my heart no pleasure. My heart took delight in all my WORK, and this was the reward for all my labour.
- 11 Yet when I surveyed all that my hands had done and what I had toiled to achieve, everything was fleeting, a chasing after the wind; nothing was gained under the sun.

Why study the words of the Preacher?

- · Learn from one who "had it all"
 - · Wisdom started as a gift from God
- · Don't take any steps towards the abyss
- Value the discerning that only turning to God's wisdom will bring the greatest good in this fleeting life
- · Maintain your eternal perspective
- · End well on the path God started in you
- Do we really seek the greatest possible good?
